Net Zero Building given the 'Green' Light

It's been an exciting month at The Hart School and we have welcomed a large number of visitors on to the site for the Grand Opening of our Net Zero Building. For those that do not already know, over the Summer, the school was the recipient of five brand new classrooms and toilet facilities in a state-of-the-art block. The rooms come complete with interactive technology and air-conditioning. The new building uses a combination of sustainable technologies to reach an A+ energy

efficiency rating and can actually generate more energy for the rest of the school. This combination of lean, green and clean technology results in a highly sustainable building.

Members of the Net Zero

Allison and our own Director
of Estates, Jon Ward, held
an assembly for Year 7
students where they were
given a detailed presentation
about the whole process
and the intricacies involved

in the production. Students were then able to ask any questions to the experts about all aspects of the process which was a great way of gaining insight into this growing industry. They were particularly interested in aspects around helping the environment. A ribbon-cutting took place with our governors and the CEO of the Trust, Mr Marc Jordan. We also planted a cedar tree (the same wood that clads the building) to commemorate the day.

The following week we were privileged to host the Rt Hon MP Amanda Milling and members of the local council for a tour of the new building and see the improvements that had been made around the rest of the school site. We continue on our rapid journey of renovation and it is wonderful to see projects like this happening in our school. IT'S NOT OKAY...


We have been focusing on Harmful Sexual Behaviour this term, with our work with students in all year groups focusing on 'It's Not Okay...'.

This has been brought to the attention of schools across the country following the 'Me Too' Campaign and Ofsted research and surveys with over 75 schools across the country a year and a half ago.

We have focused this term on how students speak and act towards each other. We have worked on this in assemblies led by Mrs Lewis (Safeguarding Lead), tutor sessions and in workshops in Key Stage 3. The aim is to make students aware of inappropriate language and actions, which includes homophobic, transphobic, sexist and racist language.

In our workshops with Key Stage 3, we have focused on reporting these incidents and what happens next, with a focus on what will happen, what might happen and what won't happen. Students have all discussed to whom they report incidents too – tutors, Heads of Year, Student Support Officers, teachers and also the Safeguarding Team. We also have the facility to report online confidentially through ARCS.









SKI TRIP

Over the last 8 weeks 32 of our Hart school students have taken part in dry ski lessons at Swadlincote ski centre.

The students and staff are excited and preparing for the first school ski trip since before the national lockdowns. A mix of years 8, 9 and 10 will travel to Italy in February to enjoy learning a new skill in the mountains whilst immersing themselves in the language and local foods. The students have been brilliant on the dry ski slope, whatever the weather...rain or shine (there's been a lot of rain!) Fingers crossed for plenty of snow and sunshine for them to continue developing their skills.


