Year 11 PPEs (Mock) Examinations

A reminder that the Year 11 PPE Examinations begin after the half term break. They have been working hard both in lessons and after school during the interventions and are putting themselves in a good place to secure a really pleasing set of results this summer.

There are actually only seven full teaching weeks left until the summer exam series fully commences with two weeks of mocks and bank holidays in the mix, leaving only 35 teaching days. The clock is certainly ticking.

INTRODUCING OUR NEW ADDITION TO THE HART SCHOOL FAMILY... RUFUS

The latest member of staff to join The Hart School has a very strange list of demands.

He insists on being taken out of the office for regular toilet breaks and needs brushing everyday. That's because Rufus is our very own therapy dog 'in-training'.

Therapy dogs have very special places in the schools that take the time to invest in training one. The role of a therapy dog is to react and respond to people and their environment, under the guidance and direction of their handler. For example, an individual might be encouraged to gently pat or talk to a dog to teach sensitive touch and help them be calm. Having a dog in school has the potential to help young children to develop in a range of academic, personal and social areas. When Rufus has completed his training with

Miss Kinnstein, he will be able to teach empathy and appropriate interpersonal skills, help individuals develop social skills, be soothing and help to improve an individual's skills to pick up social cues imperative to human relationships.

Rufus is a 4 month old cavapoo and this breed was specifically picked due to the hypo allergenic nature of a poodle, as well as the intelligence/calmness that comes from that particular breed. He is in school to get used to his surroundings and spends every day with Miss Kinnstein (and anyone else that is lucky enough to get a bit of time with him). Very soon, he will be a full time member of staff, with students being able to access the benefits of Rufus all day, every day. From students reading to him, to being a 'pull' that can help with attendance – Rufus has so much to offer!

We've been amazed at by how the student and staff have been affected already. "He always gets a reaction when he goes into a class, and just a couple of minutes with Rufus can leave you feeling more relaxed."

It will take another 12 months for Rufus to become a qualified therapy dog and is currently having regular external training. Eventually he will be able to 'work' for three hours every day with the students that will need Rufus' help the most.






KNOWLEDGE CONNECTED DAYS OF PATTERN


Earlier this term our Year 7 and Year 8 students received specialised lessons dedicated to the CET Knowledge Connected programme.

Creative Education Trust schools use imaginative methods for linking knowledge across subject boundaries, fostering personal development and resilience and developing practical skills that prepare students for their transition to adult life and employment. The academic arts and the sciences, practical subjects and life skills all need this creativity, and creativity is valued highly by employers. **Creative Education Trust** defines creativity as the ability to find connections between the things we know and turn these connections into new ideas and action. Our key concepts consist of: Structure, Pattern, Human interaction, Meaning, Practise and Performance. This time, students investigated how Pattern is present within the world around us, and in of our subjects we study. On Tuesday 17th January, year 8 had subject specific lessons and studied how

pattern presents itself in each subject, from motif development in dance to the Fibonacci sequence in Maths. Students could see how pattern can be important in all of their subjects. On Friday 20th January, year 7 looked at different types of patterns and how they are created, whether this is manmade or seen within nature. They looked at the rules that have to exist when creating a pattern, and also investigated what happens if these rules are altered or broken. The day ended with the whole of year 7 creating a visual representation of themselves following set rules. When bringing this all together, students observed pattern on a larger scale, looking at how even their year group can be presented as a pattern. A great two days of creative, hands on learning that has started to create pathways and connections for linking their knowledge all together.







REHEARSAL WITH PRO-EXCEL

On Monday 16th January 60 students from years 7-13 had the opportunity to work alongside two professional choreographers from Pro-Excel; a dance company who create large scale dance pieces for sporting events.

Students worked tirelessly for eight hours on a routine that will be performed in the seats of the South Stand alongside 1000 other students from schools around the country.

The routine will be performed at the start of the rugby match between the Saracens Vs Harlequins, during half time. This is the first time a dance of this nature has been performed within the United Kingdom, with the likelihood of our students ending up on the television.

The students worked exceptionally hard throughout the day. Their engagement and focus were commended

throughout the rehearsals by the choreographers. As a school, we were first the choreographers had visited in this project, meaning some changes and tweaks had to be made. This was handled with complete professionalism and patience from our students who were a credit to the school.

Another all-day rehearsal is planned later this week with the choreographers before the big day, which will be another amazing experience for our students.





ENERGY ARTS PROJECT DISPLAY

Are you going to be able to spot the towers around the town?

Sixth form students Emily and Sophie were tasked with designing and painting three towers which have been 3D printed out of palm leaves.

These towers, along with others that have been designed by local primary school children and painted by an artist, will eventually have trees planted between two halves, they will be placed around Rugeley in memory of the cooling towers that used to be a local landmark.

Mrs Cooper helped the girls work out their designs and in

their spare lessons the girls set about developing their painting skills linked to local themes.

Emily chose to portray a deer on the Chase with the town gates in the background and the Cenitaf with the cooling towers, Sophie chose William Palmer the poisoner who spent all his inheritance money on horse racing.

Both students have done a fantastic job of these towers and their painting skills have improved too.
