A DAY OF ALL THINGS PATTERN

Dedicated day for the CET Knowledge Connected Programme

This week our Year 7 and Year 8 students received specialised lessons dedicated to the CET Knowledge Connected programme. This time, students investigated how pattern is present within the world around us, and in our subjects we study.

Year 8 had subject specific lessons and studied how pattern presents itself in

each subject, from motif development in dance to the Fibonacci sequence in Maths. Students could see how pattern can be important in all of their subjects.

Year 7 looked at different types of patterns and how they are created, whether this is man-made or seen within nature. They looked at the rules that have to exist when creating a pattern, and also investigated what happens if these rules are altered or broken. The day ended with the whole of year 7 creating a visual representation of themselves following set rules. A great two days of creative, hands on learning that has started to create pathways and connections for linking their knowledge all together.

CHILDRENS MENTAL HEALTH WEEK

Place2Be's Children's Mental Health Week 2024 will take place from 5-11 February 2024.

This year's theme is 'My Voice Matters'. During Children's Mental Health week, we want all children to believe 'My Voice Matters'.

'My Voice Matters' is about empowering children and young people by providing them with the tools they need to express themselves. When children feel empowered it has a positive impact on their wellbeing. Children and young people who feel that their voices are heard and can make a difference have a greater sense of community

and self-esteem.

We want all our students to be empowered to create a positive change for their mental health and wellbeing. 'My Voice Matters' also highlights the need for us to use our voices to create the changes we want to see in society. We can use our voice to make a big difference in the world we live, but equally we can all make a difference in small, everyday ways.

As part of Children's Mental Health Week, the theme of being a 'bystander' will be explored and how we, as a community, can use our voice to represent those who may have previously been marginalised or silenced.

We have several activities occurring in school to celebrate Children's Mental Health week and to encourage and help children understand how to use their voice to express themselves. NATIONAL APPRENTICESHIP WEEK

Monday 5 February marked the start of National Apprenticeship Week.

National Apprenticeship
Week is an annual weeklong celebration of
apprenticeships, and anyone
involved with them. It runs
from Monday 5 February to
Sunday 11 February 2024.
There have been a wide
range of activities to partake
in to show how positive and
exciting apprenticeships are
as an option, and to showcase
the wide range of employers,
apprenticeships, and their
success stories.

Students were delivered an assembly by Careers Lead, Kyra Caulfield, and Pippa Weavell from South Staffordshire College, to explain what apprenticeships are and what South Staffordshire College have to offer. There have also been lots of exciting things for you to access through our Facebook page.

But – what are Apprenticeships?

As an apprentice, young people will be working and learning at the same time. Meaning, they are getting paid, and receive paid time to learn too. Apprenticeships typically involve working for at least 30 hours a week, but some apprenticeships are full time, working 37-40 hours a week.

The learning element of an apprenticeship is really important, apprentices get

an equivalent of six hours of learning time per week, but this can be in various forms; a day a week, a few days a month, altogether at the beginning of the first year, online, in person, in the workplace, or with an external training provider.

Apprentices have contracts with their employer, they will be entitled to holiday pay and potentially any other benefits the company offers too.

An apprenticeship is a real job. But apprentices have no fees to pay. Instead, apprentices are paid to learn.

The range of apprenticeships available is incredible, there are now around 700

apprenticeships available, ranging from accountant to zookeeper.

The levels of apprenticeships go all the way from level 2 which is the intermediate apprenticeship level, all the way through to level 7, which is equivalent to a master's level. Apprenticeships are advertised in various places, a great place to start is Find an Apprenticeship, a government website with more than 20,000 live jobs with employers across the country.

A visit to the theatre for Year 12 students

On Thursday 25th January, our A-Level Drama students had the exciting opportunity to see the work of one of our studied Theatre practitioners. Frantic Assembly. For their A-level course, students have to study live pieces of theatre for their component one exam. Frantic Assembly's newest piece of work has adapted a classic Kafka novel turned Berkoff play into a new adaptation using physical theatre. The production was very visually exciting, providing the students with lots of things to talk about in their year 13 exam. The piece was very thought-provoking, watching the protagonist (who once was the sole provider for his family) slowly turn into an

insect. He is then no longer use to them, becoming a nuisance. 'It depicts the idea of the human struggling within a system that is designed to crush them under it's heel.'



YOUNG CARER

Is your child a young carer?

A young carer is someone aged 25 and under who cares for a friend or family member who, due to illness, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction, cannot cope without their support. Older young carers are also known as young adult carers and they may have different support needs to younger carers.

A young carer may look after a parent or care for a brother or sister. They may do extra jobs in and around the home, such as cooking, cleaning or helping someone get dressed and move around.

A young carer may also give a lot of physical help to a

parent, brother or sister who's disabled or ill. Along with doing things to help siblings, they may be giving emotional support, to family as well.
