Slightly behind Mr. Brennan's schedule, we set off at 9:15am. After losing and then regaining one coach due to satnav mishaps we arrived at De Montfort. Firstly, we completed an activity which was a little insight into the financial side of university. With a budget of £2,473 working with partners we had to plan out our first semester of finances choosing from a selection of items to buy from. Then it was lunch time "Oh this onion bhajia is spicy!" Next, we had a tour of the campus with a population of 25,000. We saw the student union, library, fashion and engineering workshops and student accommodation. The scores from the top teams across all schools were then collected and the overall winning school announced.


The Hart School Christmas Quiz 2021 winner was, Chancel Primary School.
